The Dwellingup Primary School Bush Trail Enquiry

This year students in years 2-6 are involved in a project called "The Dwellingup Primary School Bush Trail Enquiry." This STEAM project based inquiry learning program is integrated across Technologies, Geography, Science, The Arts, Literacy and Numeracy. The Department of Education's cross curriculum priorities Sustainability and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander History & Cultures are embedded throughout the programme to provide students with authentic and relevant connections to the bigger, fundamental elements of the world in a way that they can relate to and apply in their lives. Details of the project are below:

"This programme focus is on the Engineering Principles of the Design Technologies Inquiry Process: researching, prototyping, refining and implementing a bush trail at Dwellingup Primary School. Students use their existing knowledge of bush fires to formulate questions to research in order to build on their understandings of their local habitat. Real world connections are presented to students as they attend and critically evaluate the trails at the Forest Discovery Centre in Dwellingup and participate in learning experiences from guest speakers, DPAW and the Dwellingup Heritage Centre. Research on different trails guides students in the process of designing and creating a prototype 3D model of a bush trail. Students engage with the wider community and distribute a survey to identify community wants and needs. This data is utilised in the 'refine' process to strongly influence students' prototype 3D bush trail model. The properties of different materials and techniques for creating visual artworks are experimented with as students design and create information boards, resting benches and exhibition artefacts. Critical and Creative Thinking Skills are fostered as students write a synopsis of their prototype 3D bush trail model, justifying each element of their prototype while making links to learning. During a community open day, students explicitly explain their prototype and community members vote on their favourite. The winner is used as the real prototype for creation at Dwellingup Primary School. This inquiry project longevity, as students continue with maintaining and advertising the bush trail. Being student led, this inquiry enables student voice and active involvement in a major development in their school. This ownership builds students' respect and pride in Dwellingup PS."

Students have viewed some footage of various trails and talked about features of trails. This week we walked to the **Forest Discovery Centre** to look at their "Emu Trail" and other trails at the centre. Centre manager **Shani Holster** talked to students about the trails.
