Public School Review

Last Wednesday Mr Rod Lowther, Director, Public School Accountability conducted a Public School Review of our school.

Public School Reviews are conducted across all schools to provide assurance to the Minister, Director General and school communities that public schools are operating effectively and delivering high quality education to their students. The reviews also provide valuable feedback to principals and staff to help improve the performance of their schools.

He was accompanied by a principal from another school. Schools are assessed in the following areas:

- Relationships & Partnerships.
- **Learning Environment**
- Leadership
- **Teaching Quality**
- **Use of Resources**
- Student Achievement and Progress.

Prior to the review I was required to submit data and evidence to indicate our performance in the above areas. The reviewers were here for a day to validate this data / evidence. They spoke to a variety of people in our school community including parents, Warren Haugh (P&C President School Council representative, teachers, Education Assistants, Lisa our Chaplain and students.

Schools receive a performance rating of either:

Effective - The school demonstrates effective practice in creating the conditions required for student success.

OR

 Needs Improvement – The school has aspects of its practice below expectations and needs supported action to improve student success.

Proudly and happily, Dwellingup Primary School was rated as "Effective" ~ we got the BIG TICK!

K / PP Family 'Treasure'





PUBLIC SCHOOL REVIEW QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

1 Why are Public School Reviews required?

Public School Reviews are conducted across all schools to provide assurance to the Minister, Director General and school communities that public schools are operating effectively and delivering high quality education to their students. The reviews also provide valuable feedback to principals and staff to help improve the performance of their schools.

2 What is involved in a Public School Review?

A review involves a school self-assessment using an online tool, called the Electronic School Assessment Tool, followed by a school-based validation of that assessment. A school review report is provided to the school.

3 Who conducts a review?

A review team - comprising a Director, Public School Accountability and a co-opted school leader as peer reviewer - conducts each review.

4 When are schools reviewed?

A three-year cycle of review is based on a stratified selection process. The Deputy Director General, Public Schools notifies a principal two terms before the term in which their review is scheduled. The principal is alerted three weeks before their school self-assessment is due.

5 What does a principal and their staff need to do?

School staff complete and submit their school self-assessment using the Electronic School Assessment Tool. The principal prepares a schedule for the review team to conduct meetings during the school-based validation phase of the review.

6 What happens during the school-based validation?

The validation involves scheduled meetings, negotiated with the principal, school leadership, a selection of teaching and non-teaching staff, school board/council representatives and parents. Discussions flow from the information presented in the school self-assessment. The school-based phase takes one day, although extension may be negotiated if logistical matters arise.

7 What are the key features of the school review report?

The report is prepared immediately following the school-based validation. The report provides a school performance statement and rating; school context statement; summary comments for each performance domain; a visual representation of student progress and achievement data (stable cohort) for numeracy, reading and writing; and analysis of Department management requirements.

8 Is the report published on Schools Online?

While the report is not put on Schools Online, the principal is required to make it available on the school website and give a copy to the chair of the school board/council. A copy is provided to the regional executive director.

9 How is the report to be used?

The report is to be used by the principal as a resource to inform key directions for school improvement planning. The Principal, staff and board/council of a school that receives a report indicating that the school is outstanding or highly effective can provide advice and support to school staff in those schools requiring improvement.

10 What is the process for Independent Public Schools that have been reviewed by the former Department of Education Services' process?

The Public School Review cycle starts three years after an Independent Public School's most recent review undertaken by the former Department of Education Services.
