
Years 5/6 STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths) Assembly

Students in years 4/5/6 attended the "Sculpture by the Sea" exhibition at Cottesloe beach this term. We are grateful to Alcoa for funding this valuable learning experience.

As well as looking at the sculptures, students had the opportunity to meet one of the sculptors. The sculptor told the students that her sculpture had grown from her 2018 entry and that she had used 75 000 cable ties to complete it!

The students were then guided and inspired to create a sculpture of their own. We saw some very creative results. The students in years 5/6 enjoyed exhibiting their masterpieces at their assembly.

The assembly script is in the next column. The students wrote the script in conjunction with **Mr Melkert.** It is very informative and details the richness of the learning that is taking place in the senior class.





Giant Pumpkin Art


Students have been getting in the mood for the **Giant Pumpkin Festival** by completing some very vibrant art work. The pumpkin art will be displayed around the school on the day.
