
Above: Tahni is using tweezers to practise her numbers.

PP - 3 Physical Education




On Fridays students in years PP - 3 engage in physical education activities. They learn a range of skills and have a lot of fun at the same time.

"Talk for Writing" Years 1/2/3

Students in the years 1/2/3 class were delighted when a Crumpetty Tree appeared in their classroom. They learned that it is the home of the Quangle Wangle who appeared in the tree the

very next day! (If you really look carefully you can just see his feet sticking out from under his enormous hat.) The students then made their own **Ouangle** Wangles and created an entire Wangle Quangle forest at the back of their classroom.





"The Crumpetty Tree" is a "nonsense" poem by Edward Lear. The students also listened to the "Owl and the Pussycat", written by Edward Lear and "Jabberwocky" by Louis Carol. Exposure to this highly creative and engaging language inspired the students when completing their own writing. Year 1 students wrote an acrostic poem using their name and year 2 and 3 students wrote a "Crumpetty Tree" poem.



O - OPINION

R- REASON

E-EXPLANATION

O - OPINION RESTATED

Each discussion requires at least three reasons individually stated and followed up with an explanation. For example,

Dogs make the best pets because they are loyal. Dogs will greet you happily when you get home and sit beside you for hours. They love your attention.



To further embed the process, students selected a partner and chose a topic that they felt strongly about. They then prepared a **Persuasive Text** based upon an **OREO** outline and practised

delivering their argument verbally to the class. There is even a competition for the **Best Presentation and a Runner-Up.** Stay tuned for the results!




Thank you to parents who have returned forms / money. A reminder that forms are due by March 2nd and money (\$50 per child) is due by 9th March.
