The happy smiles are an indication that our brand new Dwellingup PS students are enjoying their first day! Welcome!





Multi Year Level Classes

At Dwellingup PS every child is valued as an individual and we do our best to cater for their needs. We utilise a range of screening devices and then devise an educational program to suit each child. To ensure that students receive instruction at their year and ability level, use is made of evidenced based programmes such as 'Lexile Reading', 'Reading Eggs', 'Mathletics', Minilit and Multilit. This year we have implemented a K - 6 Di Rigg Phonics Instructional program. This ensures that spelling / phonics are tracked and new spelling words are at your child's level. Intervention occurs if phonemic blends are not You can be assured that even though known. your child is in a multi-year level group they are probably getting more individualised instruction than if they were in a much larger single year group.

Instructional

Teaching

Framework

This year **Dwellingup PS** along with **Carcoola PS, North Dandalup PS and Jarrahdale PS** are collaborating with **Rostrata PS** (a high performing metropolitan school) to implement evidence based teaching practices that have been demonstrated to show greater achievement and engagement of students.

Research has shown that aside from what students themselves bring to school, teachers and teaching account for the greatest level of variance of any other factor operating in a school as detailed in the following table:

Variable	Percentage	
Students (home, personality etc)	60%	
Teachers	30%	
Schools	5-10%	
Peers	5-10%	
Principals	5-10%	

In short, as far as school is concerned, it's the teaching that matters most and this is why we have chosen to be involved in this program.

Teachers will work with external coaches throughout the year with the aim of imbedding sustainable impactful teaching practices that have been proven to improve student outcomes into their practice.

Our first session is on Monday 14th February. Relief teachers will take classes. More information about this extremely exciting project will be provided.

Student Drop Off / Pick Up

We request that all students arrive between 8.30 and 8.45am. Teachers / staff are preparing for the day's lessons before this time and this requires them to leave their classrooms to complete photocopying and to obtain resources from other areas. We are required by law to provide a Duty of Care to our students so we cannot leave children unsupervised at any time. We do not have staff available for the supervision of early arrivers.

Please also be prompt in picking up your children at the end of the day. This is a time when staff have informal and formal meetings and other commitments. Again, we cannot leave students unsupervised.

We understand that there can be extenuating circumstances and we accommodate one off requests. Please contact me (Colleen 9538 5100; 0488 225 888) to discuss these if they arise. Students have been told to report to the office if no-one arrives to collect them. (We all know about being caught behind slow trucks coming up the hill!)

Sign In / Sign Out

For the safety of all concerned, it is essential that we know who is on our school site at any given time. All visitors to the school grounds including parents need to sign in at the front desk when visiting the school. This is mandated by the Department of Education.

Parent Contact Details

It is imperative that we have up to date parent contact details in case we need to contact you at any time. Student information forms were sent out on Friday. Please ensure that all details are correct.



Please inform us immediately if any of your details change throughout the year.

Food Sharing

Please remind your child that for the safety of other children and COVID regulations, food is not to be shared. Please note that this applies to birthday cakes.

Contributions

These funds support your child in the school and are used to purchase items such as sporting and art equipment. Thank you to those parents who have already paid their contributions.

Contributions are \$40.00 per student. Arrangements can be made to stagger payment if this helps. Due to Covid, fund raising, including the Pumpkin Festival is restricted so we need funds more than ever.

Punctuality Attendance

For students to achieve success at school, they need to attend regularly. Punctuality is also vital. If children arrive late the rest of the class are settled and working and the late child has the stress of not knowing what is going on. In addition, other students are then disrupted whilst the late child catches up. Regular attendance is vital ~ the table below highlights the cumulative effect of non-attendance. Your child's attendance rate is indicated on their report. We are aware that COVID requirements impacts on attendance, therefore school should not be missed apart from medical and other essential reasons.

School Uniform

All of us were incredibly impressed with the way all parents presented their children to school this week. Wearing of school uniform indicates pride in the school, reduces competitiveness and 'brand envy' and ensures that our school maintains a good reputation in the community.

Please forward any uniform items at home that your child has outgrown. Happy homes can be found for them. Thank you to **Justine Edwards-Bech** for co-ordinating uniform sales. This is yet another duty outside her job description that she happily provides.

Lunches

Please note that we have an arrangement with the shop to provide lunch orders on **Wednesday**, **Thursday and Friday**. Please do not order on the other days as a staff member needs to go to the shop to collect the lunch orders. Most staff members are on lunch duty four days per week as it is. An unnecessary trip to the shop can result in someone missing their lunchbreak.



New parents, the lunch menu is on the table outside the staffroom door. Orders are placed in the letterbox there. Lunches can also be ordered at the General Store and we then collect them and bring them to the school. We have a Healthy Eating policy so request that soft and energy drinks are not purchased.

Home Reading / Times Tables

I cannot emphasise the importance of home reading enough. Your child needs constant practice to embed concepts into their long term memories.

Home reading need not be an onerous chore. It can be a special one —on- one time for you to spend with your child. If your child is tired, you can read the book to them. They are hearing the vocabulary, language patterns and other concepts.

As you would remember from when you were at school, embedding times tables can only be achieved by practising them ~ over and over and over again! A times tables chart on the back of the toilet door or in your child's bedroom is a good idea.

Community Use of School Facilities

The Department of Education has a policy that encourages community use of school facilities. If you wish to use the school facilities, please contact me on **0488 225 888.** A form needs to be completed that outlines obligations. Please note that smoking is not allowed on school property and if alcohol is to be consumed a Liquor License application is necessary.



"Crunch & Sip" is a program that supports parents in ensuring that children eat the recommended number of fruit and vegetable serves in a day.

National and state data tells us the consumption of vegetables is far below recommended levels with 5 out of 6 children aged 4-11 years not getting their daily recommended amount.

Aussie kids are eating an excess of energy-dense, nutrient poor foods which are setting up poor habits which could lead to a lifetime of poor choices. The recommendation is 5 serves of vegetables and two serves of fruit each day. The "Crunch & Sip" program supports the achievement of this target.

Please ensure that your child has a piece of fruit or vegetables for our morning scheduled "Fruit Break". We always welcome donations of fruit and vegetables. Due to Covid, fruit platters cannot be provided.

Cash for Cans

Mr Warren, on behalf of Dwellingup Primary School, has placed container collection bins around town. He collects these bins each week. At school the contents are sorted and the containers are placed into our large skip bin that we have been provided with through this program. We now have Noble River Estate and Banksia Springs collecting containers on our behalf as well as receiving donations from the community. Our main aim is to save rubbish from landfill and promote recycling but an added bonus is certainly the cash that is being deposited in our school bank account! These funds are used for Mr Warren's exciting projects. You will have noted that the wall behind the hanging baskets in the hall has been painted blue in readiness for a mural featuring the karrak (red-tailed black cockatoo).

A big thank you to Geoff Warren for coordinating the program, those who support it and to Mead and Lucinda Sellenger for donating the fantastic signage that has been placed on the bins.

I am aware that I have been 'relaxed' about this in the past and this is difficult for me as I am a great believer in exercise for people and dogs. However, I am required to place the safety of students first.

Students love seeing baby animals so if you want to bring them in for news, please arrange this with your child's teacher. This is essential as some children may have allergies, phobias etc.



Parent Participation / School Council / P&C

Our parent body is represented by these two organisations. Both organisations enable parent participation in the school The P&C raises an amazing amount of money and we can afford resources that our school grant would not cover.

The School Council has many functions including having input into school policy and programs, ratifying the school budget and approving fees and charges. It is Department of Education policy that parents are involved in the school. Research indicates that this has a positive effect on student outcomes / well-being.

Behaviour Management / Code of Conduct

Behaviour Management in our school is underpinned by the "Virtues' and "Choose Respect" programmes.

Designated Bushfire Zone

Our school is in a designated Bushfire Zone. We are required to have a stand-alone Bushfire Policy in the unfortunate circumstance that a fire may threaten our school / town. This plan is devised with input and advice from FESA and our wonderful local Volunteer Bushfire Brigade.

Vital information regarding Bushfire accompanies this newsletter. Please display this information in a prominent place.

Please reassure your child that FESA will issue notices well before a school evacuation would occur and that parents would have had ample time to collect their children (hopefully).

Arriving At School Actively

We are very impressed with the large number of students who are riding their bikes to school or walking. It is also wonderful that many parents are accompanying their children either walking or bike riding. What excellent role modelling! We are aware that many children live too far away and it is not possible for all students to walk or ride to school. I heard a report on the news the other night that there is concern as over 80% of students do not arrive at school actively. It is also wonderful to see students wearing their bike helmets.

We are grateful to the police for visiting the school at the end of last year to talk to our students about road safety. This is also taught as part of the curriculum. The most effective way to teach children about bike and road safety is modelling by an adult (which many of you are doing).

Appendix 22

Information for Parent's on Bushfire Procedures for Dwellingup Primary School

Bushfire

In the event of a bushfire threatening the school, the school will notify DFES and the **Bushfire Plan** will be invoked by way of the school siren with a series of three sequenced blasts, or if the power is out, by way of the large external bell with three sequenced rings.

Bushfire-Watch community

During a bushfire, Emergency Services provide as much information as possible through a number of different channels. There are three levels of warning, **ADVICE**, **WATCH AND ACT** and **EMERGENCY WARNING**. These change to reflect the increasing risk to life and the decreasing amount of time you have until the fire arrives.

Advice

If the school is likely to be threatened by the fire, activate the Emergency Management Plan immediately. Notify DFES Communication Centre of your decision and relocation point.

An ADVICE provides you with information on a bushfire that is not threatening lives or property but may be causing smoke near the school. Turn off evaporative air conditioners. Regular checks of the school are to be undertaken paying special attention to the evaporative air conditioners.

Watch and Act

A WATCH AND ACT message tells you the fire conditions are changing and there is a possible threat to lives and the school. The Principal's decision to leave or relocate students, staff and visitors off site should be based upon assessment of known information and current circumstances, including advice from emergency services or observations at the time of the event.

Emergency Warning

An EMERGENCY WARNING is the highest level of warning and tells you of immediate danger. In some circumstances it may start with a siren sound called the Standard Emergency Warning Signal (SEWS) to get your attention as the fire is about to arrive. SEWS is a distinctive sound that is broadcast immediately prior to major emergency announcements on radio, television and other communication systems. SEWS tells people 'you need to listen- there is an emergency in your area and you need to take action now'. It is used like a siren and is strictly controlled for use by an authorised hazard management agency only.

The School should activate their Bushfire Plan in regards to evacuation. Consideration will include; location of fire and ability to travel safely to the selected relocation point, notify DFES Communication Centre of your decision and relocation point. The Principal is to liaise with the Regional Executive Director. If it is not safe to evacuate, direct all students, staff and visitors to the school's *Safer Location*.

Bushfire- Act

Response when a bushfire starts and the school is open

- Evacuation Procedure

- The siren will ring in three short bursts.
- Because our buildings are on two sites, the students will go straight to their classrooms if its recess
 or lunch time.
- Any students or teachers who are not in their rooms when the siren is sounded will go directly to their rooms.
- Teachers will then mark the roll and quietly walk the students across the road to the ECE Room 1 building to wait for evacuation.

- All other staff will meet in the Front Office and report to the Registrar and walk across the road to the Assembly area at the ECE.
- The Principal will check with each teacher and the Registrar to make sure all students and school personnel are present.
- · If anyone is missing police will be informed.
- Doors and windows must be closed and evaporative air coolers turned off.
- Students with known respiratory conditions will be identified and given special consideration.
- Principal will control this response until DFES and other emergency services arrive, who will then take over.
- The local town assembly area in Dwellingup during a bushfire is the Town Oval. There are only three
 roads out of Dwellingup and they are all bounded by tall Jarrah forest. We are to work in unison with
 DFES and the Shire of Murray's Emergency Management and take directions from these
 organisations.

Safer Location Procedure – if evacuation is not possible

School to remain on site on advice from DFES.

Early Childhood Education Room 1. This building is located adjacent to our main school buildings. It is new, has reverse cycle air conditioning and is at the Eastern end of the school grounds. Fires usually come from the North-North West so this is the safest place for our students and staff to assemble.

- Because our buildings are on two sites, the students will go straight to their classrooms if its recess
 or lunch time.
- Any students or teachers not in their rooms when the siren is sounded will go directly to their rooms.
- Teachers will then mark the roll and quietly walk the students across the road to the ECE Room 1 building.
- All other staff will meet in the Front Office and report to the Registrar and walk across the road to the Assembly area at the ECE.
- The Principal will check with each teacher and the Registrar to make sure all students and school personnel are present.
- If anyone is missing police will be informed.
- Doors and windows must be closed and evaporative air coolers turned off.
- Students with known respiratory conditions will be identified and given special consideration.
- Principal will control this response until DFES and other emergency services arrive, who will then take over.

The local town assembly area in Dwellingup during a bushfire is the Town Oval. There are only three roads out of Dwellingup and they are all bounded by tall Jarrah forest. We are to work in unison with FESA and the Shire of Murray's Emergency Management Plan and take directions from these organisations.

- Parent Access

Parents will be informed by SMS services where to collect their children. Call the school on 9538 5100 or 0488 225 888 if needed (Bushfire Plan). Information will be posted on the school's Facebook page and all parents who have emails will be advised. This will be done upon advice from the HMA's Incident Controlling Officer.

In the information regarding Fire Emergency, parents are to pick up their children and to monitor the local media for specific access information. Dwellingup parents are skilled in the knowledge of what to do when they are first alerted to a bushfire and they come straight to the school, get their children and head out of town.

If there are children not picked up the school will evacuate off-site on advice from DFES

- Pinjarra Senior High School. If the ECE building is deemed by the Police and DFES to be an unsafe lockdown/ refuge area, the students and staff will be directed by these authorities to evacuate to Pinjarra SHS for parent pickup. This will keep traffic congestion at a minimum in the fire zone. It will be the HMA's (Hazard Management Agency) Incident Controllers task to make these arrangements. This information will be distributed to parents via SMS, Facebook and the ABC.

Back to school Keeping your children safe

Welcome back for 2022

All schools are open from Monday 31 January and school staff look forward to seeing their students and families on day one of Term 1. As with every year, it will be an exciting start with new teachers, new classmates and new things to learn.

As we prepare for the start of school, we are all mindful of COVID-19 transmission occurring in the community. We have developed a 'Safe Return to School Plan' to keep students safe at school so they can continue to learn and thrive in the best educational setting.

As parents/carers, you can help us keep our students safe by supporting our Plan and using COVID-safe practices when you come to school for drop off/pick up, assemblies and sports carnivals, parent/teacher interviews or to volunteer.

Our Safe Return to School Plan

Every public school in WA is following this plan. It is based on the latest health advice. It provides guidance on:

- ensuring teaching and learning continues
- mandatory vaccination (including booster) requirements for all school staff
- · vaccination requirements for regular visitors to school sites
- hygiene, ventilation and other health and safety measures
- how to adapt and respond to COVID-19 based on health advice

Vaccination requirements

- All school staff must meet the vaccination requirements.
- Parents and carers are not required to show proof of vaccination when:
 - dropping off or picking up their child from school, including entering the classroom
 - volunteering at school on an ad hoc basis (attending only one school/education facility no more than once per week)
 - attending an event such as an assembly, sports carnival or parent teacher interview.
- Parents and carers are required to provide proof of their double dose vaccination from 31 January 2022 and must have their third dose (booster) within one calendar month of becoming eligible or an exemption when:
 - volunteering at the school more than once a week or at multiple schools within a week (this includes volunteering at the school canteen, uniform store or an in-class literacy or numeracy program)
 - working in an unpaid capacity at the school more than once a week or at multiple schools within a
 week
 - participating in an endorsed program at the school where parent attendance is required (such as KindiLink).
- Students are not required to be vaccinated, unless:
 - they are on a work placement where they will need to comply with the requirements of that workplace.



 they are on an excursion or at a venue, aged 16 years and older and are required to comply with the vaccination requirements of that venue and show proof of vaccination.

Parents are encouraged to get their children 5 years and older vaccinated. Information on the safety and efficacy of the COVID-19 vaccines is available on healthywa.wa.gov.au.

 All visitors and contractors who enter a school site more than once a week must meet vaccination requirements and show proof of vaccination.

Proof of vaccination

There are a few ways you can show proof of your COVID-19 vaccination, both in a digital and paper-based form. The easiest way to show your proof of vaccination evidence is using the ServiceWA app or your digital wallet.

Masks

All secondary students must wear a mask when there is a public health requirement in place to do so (masks are currently required in Perth, Peel and the South West regions), unless:

- they have a physical, developmental or mental illness, condition or disability which makes wearing a face covering inappropriate
- they are deaf or hard of hearing and visibility of the mouth is essential for communication
- they are engaged in physical exercise
- they are eating, drinking or taking medicine.

Staff may remove their mask when providing teaching or instructions to students.

Primary students can choose to wear a mask and are encouraged to do so. Based on advice from the Chief Health Officer, once there is a high caseload of COVID-19 in the environment, masks will become mandatory for students in Year 3 and above.

Health, ventilation and hygiene

Our schools will continue with hygiene and cleaning measures based on the current health advice from the Department of Health.

- Students and staff are encouraged to regularly clean their hands with soap and/or sanitiser.
- Staff, students and parents/carers must stay home when sick.
- Physical contact and physical greetings are avoided where possible.
- Schools are ventilated according to our ventilation strategy approved by the Chief Health Officer. Statewide, classrooms have been audited and will be ventilated in accordance with these guidelines through a combination of fresh air, by keeping windows and doors open; using fans, air conditioners and evaporative coolers; and, where necessary air purifiers.
- Surfaces in classrooms, staff areas, washroom/toilets and drink fountains are cleaned daily.
- · Playgrounds and play equipment are cleaned weekly.
- Adults maintain 1.5 metres distance from other adults, where practicable.

Medically vulnerable students

Additional provisions are in place for vulnerable students including modified educational planning and specialised equipment for students in education support settings.

If your child cannot attend school because they, or a family member, have an immune compromised medical condition, speak to their teacher or principal. You can access support for your child from the School of Special Educational Needs: Medical and Mental Health. Talk to your local school for more information.

Unwell student or staff member

If a student or staff member shows possible symptoms of COVID-19, they will be sent home and asked to seek testing in accordance with State guidelines. While the student waits to be picked up, they will be given a mask to wear and be isolated from others.

The student will be provided with support to learn from home while they are waiting for a test result or quarantining. If they test positive for COVID-19, the Department of Health have processes in place to advise close contacts, so they can also be tested.



School closure

If the Chief Health Officer advises us that a school needs to close, your school will:

- provide online learning resources and/or hardcopy learning packages
- support vulnerable students remotely or refer them to the School of Special Educational Needs
- · provide additional support for students' mental health and wellbeing.

Off-site school activities

School activities may operate with the ongoing promotion and practise of good hygiene principles and physical distancing between adults, where possible. Schools will ensure, where applicable, that businesses have COVID-19 Safety Plans that are up to date and will continue to consider COVID-19 as part of their excursion risk assessment. Staff and students will also need to comply with mandatory vaccination requirements that apply to the venue where activities are held.

The latest public health requirements, including vaccinations and mask wearing, are available on our website.
