


Above and left: We all looked up and saw a whole tree full of buds. It won't be long before we see little leaves.


Magic Potions

We will get to see a lively group of children in remote **Milikapiti** and **Jilkminggan**, in the **Northern Territory** joyfully share their stories, cultures and languages.

Excitedly they respond to an unexpected call from ILF Ambassador and music icon, Jessica Mauboy, and proudly teach her a well-loved song in Tiwi and Mangarrayi, before ILF Ambassador, author and performer, Gregg Dreise sings the song in Gamilaraay Yuwaalaraay.

Audiences will be encouraged to stretch and bend and sing in three different languages, from three different places!

Of course, all this hard work builds an appetite and the children head off to hunt for a feed in the nearby waters before a well-earned fire-side feast.

Audiences of all ages will delight in this magical story led by children, sharing a snippet of life in remote Australia and the richness and diversity of First Nation peoples' cultures, languages and stories.

2022 is the first year of UNESCO's Decade of Indigenous Languages. Indigenous Literacy Day celebrates and promotes the revitalisation and preservation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander languages now and for future generations of Indigenous children.



Holyoake Excursion


Last week students in years 3/4/5/6 visited the former Holyoake townsite. They learned that the mill in Holyoake operated until 1959 and that it was a thriving community until destroyed by fire in 1961; the same fire that destroyed a lot of Dwellingup.

I extend my thanks to former resident Mr Don Devlin and to Lee and Lainee Vanelst for driving Mr Devlin around thus providing me with the information about the town he grew up in. Lainee's father and Anika's grandfather, Mr Michael Dillon (dec) also grew up in Holyoake.

DWELLINGUP PRIMARY SCHOOL ~ An Education in Nature

Nestled in the Jarrah forest just 20 minutes drive from Pinjarra you will find the scenic township of Dwellingup. And, at the heart of the town is Dwellingup Primary School surrounded by outstanding gardens and nature play environments all constructed by talented and award-winning gardener Geoff Warren.

This amazing outdoor environment allow the students to engage in hands on learning, and vital interactions with natural elements whilst engaging in imaginative play.

Since the 1980s the average time children spend outside playing has dropped from an average of 4-6 hours per day to 45-90 minutes per day. Ask most adults and they can recall childhood memories of building cubbies, climbing trees, riding bikes, and fishing for tadpoles. Today most children don't have these same freedoms for extended nature play and are missing out on critical learning and development opportunities. Urban developments, bigger houses and smaller properties mean that children don't have access to as much green space.

Thanks to the wonderful efforts of Geoff Warren, the Dwellingup Primary School students have daily access to lush gardens including fruit trees, climbing trees, cubby houses, mini golf, nature playgrounds, and lush lawns for sport. Students are actively encouraged to engage in creative and imaginative play including building fairy gardens, using found ingredients to make magic potions, and building of forts from which to defend the universe.

The school backs onto a pocket of bush allowing teachers and students to access environmental learning at anytime including a newly constructed bird hide for bird watching.

Colleen Sing, has been a long term principal at Dwellingup Primary School and feels very privileged to live and work in the wonderful Dwellingup community. She believes that 'Nature play is the ultimate sensory experience. It requires students to engage all their senses every time they step outside the classroom. When children play in nature there are numerous physical and mental health benefits including physical exercise, improved balance, co-ordination, flexibility, and strength as well as the sense of wellbeing and mindfulness that being in nature provides. It's beautiful to see the students developing a growing respect and curiosity for the natural environment around them.'
