

# 'Talk for Writing' Years 4/5/6

Students in years 4/5/6 are learning how to write an **Information Report**. The **Information Report** format can be used for any subject. Students were required to write an informative article about a made-up creature. After reading Lara's Information Report, we wish there were real Monpanlebears.

#### **MONPANLEBEAR**

The Monpanlebear is a rare jungle animal from the family Ursidae.

The Monpanlebear is a rare, exotic animal known to be a mix of three different creatures as it has the tail of a lemur, the body, legs and feet of a polar bear and the head of a giant panda. Its tail is curly, white and fluffy with black stripes after every 1.5 inches of its tail. The body is a hard yet soft surface while the legs and feet are soft and a little bit furry. The head is a blank, white, soft surface with black splotches around the eyes. The ears are white with black fluff inside of them.

The Monpanlebear is known to seek shelter in the largest rainforest which is the Amazon rainforest. Because of its large, strong tail, the Manpanlebear is able to hang upside down on tree branches and swing from tree to tree. It is known to do this since it needs to collect strong materials for its home, after all, polar bears are heavy Arctic animals.

The Monpanlebear is both herbivorous and carnivorous with its diet including birds and various fruits such as mango, coconut and figs. It chomps off the coconut's hard skin and uses it in its house, it then drinks the coconut water and eats the soft, chewy white bit. Usually it chomps up the fig and swallows it in one big GULP! But children are known to peel the skin off first.

The Monpanlebear swings from tree to tree ignoring its ENORMOUS weight. It also is able to climb over thirty-five metres high and jump off with minimum injuries.

The Monpanlebear is really rare. Scientists have recorded only fifty of their kind left of Earth. There are not many but people are helping to bring back more of their kind.

#### **Alcoa Excursion**

Last Tuesday students from years 4/5/6 were picked up by a bus and taken to **Alcoa's Myara** Office where we met Community Education Officers, **Ruth and Moira.** After morning tea, students alternated between 'driving' a simulator dump truck and 'choc chip mining'.

The 'choc chip mining' activity taught the students about the mining process. Students drew an irregular

shape which represented the mining lease. They then drew in habitat trees, historical sites and sites that have significance to Aboriginal people. Alcoa is not permitted to mine in these places. Students then needed to carefully extract the alumina (choc chips) from the bauxite.



Many of our families work in mining including at Alcoa and some of our students got to meet members of their family. **Kim Birmingham** showed some students the Control Room where he works and **Max Fort** accompanied us on the bus and helped to explain how the crusher and other machines work.

After enjoying a delicious lunch provided by Alcoa at Myara, students got back into the bus and had a look at the mining operations and rehabilitation. They also looked at the giant crusher and conveyor belt.



It was explained to students that Alcoa has to rehabilitate the jarrah forest after mining. This does not happen in other countries such as Indonesia where up to two thirds of their jungle has been destroyed.

We then travelled to the workshop. It needs to be enormous because there are gigantic dump trucks and other machines being fixed up inside. Workshop Manager Anthony Cocivera gave the students a fascinating tour and allowed them to climb up on the dump truck. Anthony told the students that he attended Dwellingup Primary School and Pinjarra Senior High School. He explained that it is important to work hard at school and work hard when you get into the work place. Anthony's message was very inspiring, and we thank him for the personalised nature of the tour. He was delighted to show the Dwellingup students around.





Mrs Myles told the students how she was involved in a project that took her to Aboriginal communities all over Arnhem Land. In the Northern Territory. She made books with Aboriginal children. Older children read these books and their translations to younger students.

#### The Arts ~ Music

On Friday **Alby and Otis**' mother **Edo** has been teaching music to the students in years PP-3 while **Mrs Kinal** is teaching recorder to students in years 4/5/6.



Edo taught the students about pitch and rhythm and introduced 'solfege'.

Syllables (doh, re, mi. fa, so, la, ti, doh) are assigned to notes of the scale to



enable the students to mentally hear the pitches of a piece of music. Students also learned that this is written as a musical score. Music can be 'read', just like books but the method is different.

Students also learned that just like them, instruments can be grouped into families. They learned some more about the string instrument family.


# Recycling / Charities

Children learn that violence is never O.K.






Above: Many of us can remember when the post office was on the corner. If you look carefully you can see 'Caltex' written on the veranda as well as a bank sign.
