On Tuesday, some of the students in years 4/5/6 exhibited the sculptures that they made during their "Sculptures by the Sea" excursion. Harmony Day / Week

Harmony Week 2023



Harmony Week is the celebration that recognises our diversity and brings together Australians from all different backgrounds.

Students made a lovely **Harmony Week** poster, **Macy's grandad** visited the school and shared his Māori culture with students in PP – 3 and

students in years 3-6 travelled to Mandurah to learn about Philippine and Indonesian culture.

Miss Fisher told us that at her previous school fifty different cultures were represented!



Harmony Week ~ Māori Culture

Last week **Alby**, **Macy and Mia's grandad**, provided a wonderful session to the students in PP and years 1/2/3 about Māori culture. He was very capably assisted by **Lee**.

Students learned some Māori words and phrases; that a Māori greeting where noses are rubbed is called the 'hongi'; they performed the 'Pukana' which is part of the Haka dance that only males perform (after watching a Haka); they learned about 'Kauan' which are facial tattoos and that Maori people use a cooking method called a 'hangi'. Students viewed Māori traditional housing that have beautiful carvings on the entrance.

Students also learned that like Australia, Captain Cook was the first European person to locate New

Zealand. Alby and Lee also talked about and showed images of volcanoes, hot springs, the snow, the wildlife including kiwis and other fascinating information about this beautiful country.

We thank Lee and Alby for sharing their fascinating culture with our students.

Thank you to **Carolina** and her group for sharing Philippine and Indonesian culture with students in years 3-6 on Thursday.




Above: When we arrived, we learned about Philippine food by eating it. The pork and vegetable samosas were delicious and most of us had seconds.

Balanced Curriculum Delivery

At Dwellingup Primary School we deliver Numeracy and Literacy via an explicit teaching model. Students are assessed regularly, their progress tracked and adjustments to the level at which they are working is made. Targeted intervention occurs when necessary.

We balance this explicit approach by 'authenticity' in other learning areas. Students engage and learn a lot more with a 'hands on' Science experiment than what they do with a worksheet, for example. Our staff go above and beyond in this area and this now extends to **Lainee Vanelst** with the lovely play-based learning experiences she is providing for Playgroup children.

Arts ~ Visual Arts / Music / Drama / Dance

This term the Arts curriculum which includes the above strands in addition to visual arts, has been delivered in an interesting and authentic manner.

- Students in years 3-6 participated in a music workshop with **David Pye**, director of the Fremantle Symphony orchestra.
- Students had the opportunity to participate in / attend a performance by the Fremantle Symphony Orchestra in the local hall.
- All students enjoyed a performance of "Sunday Lemonade."
- Students in years 4/5/6 travelled to Cottesloe and participated in a "Sculpture by the Sea" visual arts workshop and then received a guided tour of the sculptures.
- Students in years 3/4/5/6 learned a Philippine and Indonesian dance. During an excursion to Mandurah.
- Students in years PP-3 receive music instruction from **Edo O'Neill** each week.
- Wendy Bell and Lainee Vanelst deliver a wonderful Visual Arts program to students in years PP-3 each week.
- Mrs Kinal teaches recorder to students in her own time.
- Students in years K 4 will view a performance of the W.A. Ballet of Peter and the Wolf on Wed. 29th March.

A grant has been obtained from the **Dwellingup** Community Association to subsidise the cost of the W.A. Ballet "Peter and the Wolf" excursion

(MPAC entry and bus). The cost to parents is \$7.00 instead of \$34.00. We thank this Association for supporting this event as well as the continued support they give to the wider community.

Years 4/5/6 Science

The 4/5/6 class have been experimenting in Biological science, looking at adaptations and how environmental factors affect the development of various life forms.

In this experiment we see lentil seeds growing healthily in fresh water, how growth is stunted in acidic water and how a struggle for life is occurring in the salty and mouldy sweet water as the seeds struggle to adapt to these conditions.

In another experiment, plastic bags were tied over two differently adapted plant species and measured transpiration rates or water loss. The succulent, desert dwelling plant transpired only about 30ml whilst the leafy green shrub released 214ml of water in the same time period. This graphically illustrated how desert species must conserve water in order to survive.



Containers for Change

worth of containers which is a lot of rubbish being kept out of landfill. Thank you to **Mr Warren** and his helpers for collecting the containers and the year 4/5/6 students for sorting them.

Recycling / Charities




