Aboriginal Season: Makaru

Makaru sees the coldest and wettest time of the

vear come into full swing. Traditionally, this was a good time of the year to move back inland from the coast as the winds turned to the west and south bringing the cold weather and rains.



As the waterways and catchments started to fill, people were able to move about their country with ease and thus their food sources changed from sea, estuarine and lake foods to those of the lands in particular the grazing animals such as the kangaroo. As well as a food source, animals provided people with many other things. For example, 'Yongar' or kangaroos not only provided meat but also 'bookas' (animal skin cloaks that were used as the nights became much cooler). Nothing was left; even the bones and sinews were used in the manufacturing of bookas and for hunting tools such as spears.

Makuru is also a time for a lot of animals to be pairing up in preparation for breeding in the coming season. If you look carefully, you might now see pairs of 'Wardongs' (ravens) flying together. You also notice these pairs not making the usual 'ark ark arrrrrk' that these birds are well known for when flying solo. Upon the lakes and rivers of the Southwest, you'll also start to see a large influx of the Black Swan or 'Mali' as they too prepare to nest and breed.

Flowers that will start to emerge include the blues and purples of the Blueberry Lilly (Dianella revoluta) and the Purple Flags (Patersonia occidentalis). As the season comes to a close, you should also start to notice the white flowers of the weeping peppermint (Agonis flexuosa) as the blues start to make way for the white and cream flowers of Djilba.

Farewell Autumn

Winter is nearly with us but there are still plenty of autumn leaves around. Mr Warren kindly left a great big pile of autumn leaves for the students to jump in! He also left some rakes around so that the students could tidy up after their fun.

Dwellingup '100' UCI Event



Thank you to whoever left the fabulous old bicycles down at the recycle shed. The years 4/5/6 students will commence our first UCI project this week. The project is inspired by one of the sculptures the students saw at "Sculpture by the Sea" this year. This work is titled, "Artist at Work" by Tom de Munk-Kerkmeer. "Riding the push-bike, moving materials, and transporting artworks are central to this artist's daily life."

The project will end up looking a bit like the picture at the bottom! We can't wait to see the finished 'sculpture'.





We are pleased that Tom de Munk-Kerkmeer obviously uses recycled materials to complete his artwork as did a lot of other artists at "Sculpture by the Sea". One of the sculptures was made entirely of plastic bottle lids.

We have enough old bikes now, but we still require old bike wheels for Mrs Kinal's project for the years K/PP students.

Miss Fisher's years 1/2/3 class project requires plastic lids so keep those coming in please. Mr Warren has a great non-bike related project utilising plastic lids so please encourage all of your friends / relatives to collect them so that we protect the environment and beautify our school!

Design and Technology

To begin our term of **Design and Technology** the classes from **K** to 6 have been looking at mechanism and moving parts. We have looked at how mechanisms are used 'in the real world' and then used a similar mechanism to create our own fun projects.

The students in years 4, 5, 6 have been learning about hydraulics and how hydraulics is used to transfer power from one place to another.....even around corners. We see hydraulics used a lot in industry to power movement in construction machinery. It is also used to lift draw bridges and to power brakes.

The 4, 5, 6, class used a wooden makers' kit to build their own hydraulic claws. This class has now started walking to the Forest Discovery Centre once a week to build woodwork projects in the workshops. This week the time was mostly spent going through the expectations in the workshop, setting up our toolboxes and learning how to use some of our tools. Next week the fun we start building our first begins as project....watch this space!

The first project the years K-3 students completed was a wind powered car. We used a number of recycled materials and a balloon to build and race our own little cars. Next, we looked at scissor mechanisms and how they extend and retract, for example scissor lifts, and expandable scissor rollers. Our first project using the scissor mechanism was a snapping crocodile / dragon. This week we began our next project using a scissor mechanism. We are using timber to build a 'grabbing claw'......Mrs Holster made us do lotssssssss of sanding.

Playgroup News


Last week the K/PP students visited their little friends at Playgroup on their way back to the ECE after running some laps around the oval.


