Quality Teaching Strategy "Shaping Minds"


In 2023 the Department of Education implemented an initiative titled, "Quality Teaching Strategy". All evidence supports that of all the factors that impact student learning, the most powerful factor that can be controlled is the quality of teaching.

In 2022 Dwellingup Primary School partnered with North Dandalup P.S., Carcoola P.S. Jarrahdale P.S. and Rostrata P.S. to implement "Shaping Minds" which is aligned to this strategy. The teachers who commenced this Professional Learning in 2022 were Miss Shari Baker, Miss Hailey Davies and Mrs Kellie Evans who of course, are no longer at the school. Waroona DHS implemented "Shaping Minds" this year and Mr Carter and Miss Fisher have joined that program. Aboriginal Season - Djilba (August - September)

The Noongar Season 'Djilba' is represented by the colour pink as it symbolises growth of wildflowers and plants.

This is the start of the massive flowering explosion that happens in the South West beginning with the yellow flowering plants such as the acacias.

Djilba is a transitional time of the year, with some very cold and clear days combining with warmer, rainy and windy days mixing with the occasional sunny day or two.

Traditionally, the main food sources included many of the land-based grazing animals including the yongar (kangaroo), the waitj (emu) and the koomal (possum).

As the days start to warm up, we start to see and hear the first of the newborns with their proud parents out and about providing them with food, guiding them through foraging tasks and protecting their family units from much bigger animals, including people!

The woodland birds are still nest bound, hence the swooping protective behaviour of the koolbardi (magpie), djidi djidi (willy wag tails) and chuck-a-luck (wattle birds).

As the season progresses and the temperatures continue to rise, the flower stalks of the balgas (Grass Trees) emerge in preparation for the coming Kambarang season.

Book Week Dress Up



Last Tuesday was incredibly rainy which matched Play Groups' 'winter' theme. Last week Scarlette's little sister Matilda and grandma Roz


