

### **Indigenous Literacy Day**

On Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> September we joined over **200 000 thousand students** across Australia for a simultaneous broadcast from **Sydney Opera House.** 



Before tuning in, we looked at a map of Aboriginal language groups that existed in Australia at the time of European settlement. There were more than 500 dialects and about 250 distinct languages at that time. In 2021, over 150 Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (ATSI) languages were spoken. 76 978

Islander (ATSI) languages were spoken. 76 978 ATSI people reported speaking an ATSI language at home in 2021, up from 63 754 in 2016. (Australian Bureau of Statistics)

The session started off with ILF ambassador, **Jessica Mauboy** asking students the following questions, "Would you cuddle up with a **jurru**? Do you have a **tjikiwan** dog at home? And what would you do if you saw a sneaky **Kyembal**?"

After this introduction we jumped on a virtual plane to Barunga in the Northern Territory, Rubibi (Broome) in north Western Australia and Weipa on the Cape York Peninsula in Queensland, to find out!

We enjoyed our virtual journey across the country into First Nations storytelling and learned some new words in **Kriol**, **Yawuru and Thaynakwith** languages.

We joined a group of young, talented songwriters with their ILF mentor **Justine Clarke**, for a special performance of their song, **Shordi Krik**, at the **Barunga Festival** in the Northern Territory. We also found out out why life is sweet at **Shordi Krik**.



In **Rubibi**, our senses tingled as we discovered there are more than

four seasons a year, and on the Cape York Peninsula, when we looked, we found something unexpected!

# National Threatened Species Day



On 7 September each year, many people stop and reflect on the fact that on that same date in 1936, Australia's Tasmanian tiger, also known as the thylacine, slipped over the extinction line.

National Threatened Species Day is a day when we shine a spotlight on all the Australian native animal and plant species that are facing similar fates to that of the Tasmanian tiger. Today we celebrate our iconic Aussie wildlife and reflect on the fact that 565 native species are currently listed as threatened. More than 300 million native

animals are killed by cats in Australia each year. 85% of animals killed by cats are never brought



home giving some cat owners the impression that their cats don't hunt wildlife. Thank you to the responsible cat owners who keep their cats in at night. At school we have a bandicoot (quenda) population, and these animals are nocturnal.

### **Lost Eden Gallery**

Last Wednesday our students visited the latest exhibition at the Lost Eden Gallery. Our school is very fortunate that we have an open invitation to visit the gallery by owners, Peter and Monique Tippett. We visit on Wednesdays because that is the day that the artists are in residence. The exhibitions are always amazing and the current one is no exception. Several artists had their works exhibited and many were made from recycled or found objects.

Students received informative talks from two of the artists. They described what inspired them and techniques used in the completion of their artworks. It is an amazing experience for students to listen to language that is outside the realm of their usual experience and certainly supports thought processes.


